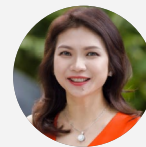

U.S. Election and Implications for Trade and Supply Chains

As the United States begins a new presidential term under the leadership of Donald Trump, his approach to tariffs and trade will likely continue to play a dominant role in shaping U.S.-Asia relations.

Trump's previous administration, known for its "America First" stance, focused on implementing tariffs on China and other trading partners to address trade imbalances and protect American industries. With his return to the White House, it is expected that these protectionist measures will be expanded, potentially leading to higher tariffs on goods from key Asian economies. This would likely increase costs for Asian exporters, disrupt supply chains, and spur companies to reconsider their production and trade strategies. In response, Asian countries are likely to pursue a range of countermeasures including retaliatory tariffs, diversifying trade partners, and seeking stronger regional trade agreements to reduce their dependence on the U.S. market.

This session will explore how Trump's trade policies will reshape economic ties between the U.S. and Asia, with a focus on the potential challenges and strategic responses from key Asian economies in the face of new tariff pressures.
